VITAL QUESTIONS OF OUR TIMES

There are hundreds of major problems in our world today. We have created them ourselves, and it will fall upon each and every one of us to help solve them. Perhaps these problems will never all be solved, but nevertheless some of our more pressing problems need a more thorough examination.

If we first understand the problems, maybe someday we will be able to help rectify them in our own special ways. We are primarily concerned with the problems found in our own country, naturally. We are a part of the vast society known as the American public. We are allowed to enact our own laws and elect our own representatives. We are allowed to move freely in our country, start our own private businesses, and make our own small private fortunes. Our major motivational drive is toward that one particular goal -- once we personal security. This unique feature of personal motivation and private gain can only be realized in a free society such as our own.

We need to start thinking more about solving our major problems rather than securing our own personal fortunes and forgetting our moral obligations in the process. If we can secure our own fortunes and help society at the same time, that is a different story.

Many of our systems in our country are becoming archaic and stagnant, infiltrated with dishonesty and shallow thinkers. (By shallow thinkers I mean those people who live from day to day and hold no eye for the future.) Systems inside our own government, systems in private enterprise, our educational systems, and even our family systems need rejuvenation before total confusion results. Changes to these systems are going to have to be well thought out and printed to the public for their ingestion. Solutions that make some kind of real sense are going to have to be figured out.

FTCS BURDETTE

1. The judicial system today is the same as the judicial system 100 years ago, but the people administering it are far different. Our moral values, priorities, prejudices, etc. have changed in the last 10-15 years. This change in attitude has led to some sweeping changes that in one way or another has had an effect on all of us. Some of these changes most of us can say "thank Christ, it was a long time coming". Some others couldn't have been worse for society in general if the criminal element of our society had made the decisions themselves; the Miranda decision for example. Most of the changes however fall into the category of (1) going to far, too fast; making changes too fast for the average person who has to abide by it or administer it to completely comprehend what is expected of them. It is a well known fact that when people are sure of what they are supposed to do or what they can do, they do nothing for fear of making a mistake. Indecision gets more people into hot water than wrongful acts. The old axiom "do something even if it's wrong" does not fit in this case. In this situation if you don't know what to do, do nothing until you have the information on which to base a rational decision.

The above two sentences may sound like a contradiction but if you change nothing, then you are making a decision to stand pat which leads to the other category of some of these decisions; making the proper decision but for all the wrong reasons or change just for the sake of change. A lot of the decisions made by the courts in the last 15 years, especially during the first 10 years of WARREN's reign as Chief Justice, was made because the members of the Court did not have the guts or the intelligence, which isn't likely, to say NO. A note on Justice WARREN. He has a history of being an extremely rash individual both in his private business life and as a so-called public servant. An interesting sidelight is that while making rash decisions, etc. prior to becoming a justice, the man and/or his friends/acquaintances always made money off his decisions. Administering a state other than California, which had hardly been touched as far as developing its natural resources, he would have driven it into bankruptcy. The best example I could use here is the decision concerning school prayers. The woman who brought the suit only wanted a decision so her son would not be forced to participate in morning prayers. They handed down a decision that completely outlawed prayer. Then, since the Supreme Court, which did not have to worry about political repercussions, made some of these far reaching decisions, and a very vocal minority (my opinion) made so much of them; the other courts being administered by political appointees or elected officials jumped on the bandwagon. They, up to this point, have all but handcuffed the law enforcement agencies, and made it almost impossible or so expensive to the victim of a crime to prosecute and be recompensed, that a large percentage of crimes now not only aren't prosecuted but go unreported. There is a story in a copy of Argosy on board concerning a farmer who had been robbed several times. He rigged a booby trap with a shotgun

and shot a prowler on his property in a house he owned and had posted NO TRESPASSING in the area. The prowler got a jury awarded settlement of \$30,000. winning all the farmer had worked for in his whole life. Something like that really makes you stop and think. I think capital punishment serves a purpose, but that in the past it has been abused. Crimes of passion, etc. should not be subject to the death penalty. Prisons used to serve a purpose; this also was abused. They no longer serve much of a purpose. In many cases the criminal is going to an easier life in prison than he had on the outside. People liking prisons is not going to be a deterrent to crime. If a person knew prison was going to be long and tough, he'd probably think twice before committing a crime. This toughness must also be tempered with justice and "common sense". If we don't teach them a trade, they'll be back in prison. Rehabilitation is quite another story. The biggest thing needed here is education for the general public to get rid of that general attitude that once having made a mistake a man is a lifelong criminal. This attitude has ruined some very good men in the past.

2. I think that there are two major reasons for the situation on America's college campuses; weak college administration, public officials, etc., and weak parents. It is hard to say which is the largest problem. The second reason obviously preceded the first. I have seen first hand that the majority of these "rioters" are nothing but a bunch of kids running off at the mouth for lack of something better to do and when confronted will run off and corner in a corner somewhere. For young people to be rebellious is nothing new; it has been going on for centuries. In most cases it is a good attitude because the organization that doesn't change is either dead or dying. Young people in the past have forced changes a lot quicker than the older people would normally have changed them. Older people don't like changes because they, maybe it should be we, have learned to live a certain way and changing is not an easy task. In the past it has worked well because changes were generated, but a strong set of parents, educators, administrators, public figures, etc. did not allow the younger people to push them into something they did not think would work.

Some of this probably ties into the looser moral values of today. The family unit of today doesn't have the cohesiveness it used to have in a lot of cases. I think this is very sad rather than bad because an awful lot of people are growing up today without knowing what it's like to be a responsible member of a family group. These people are really missing something. It would be presumptuous of me to pin down when this change took place, but from the ages of persons presenting non-negotiable demands, starting riots, loudly protesting and running amok with utter disregard for other people's property, life, and liberty, you would have to place the parents of these people in the age group of young people married during and just after World War 2. That was a trying time for an awful lot of people, especially the younger ones who spent 4-6 years at war and had no training with which to earn a living. A personal note to all readers: I have spent a lot of space trying to say something I felt was in great need of being said. My opinions were

asked for and I readily gave them. We could fill this and many many more issues of this paper saying the pros and cons of these questions so for what they are worth you now know a little about how I feel about these things. We can thank our lucky stars that the vast majority of young people today are in your vernacular "establishment" oriented. We in the service are lucky we get far more than our fair share of these. These questions deal with gravely serious problem areas. For that reason I have tried to be dead serious in answering them. When each and every one of us consider them, we had best be serious if we wish to maintain what controls we now have over the destiny of our country.

MMI BUCKLEY

1. I don't feel qualified to make any judgements on the country's judicial system. I do have my own personal opinions which may or may not be in agreement with public opinion. I do not think capital punishment is necessary in today's society. Many people may feel that a person who takes another's life should lose his life, but that is only some people's opinion. I feel that there should be more emphasis on rehabilitation of criminals with stricter controls on paroles. Prisons should have better conditions and be self sufficient by making use of the manpower available to them. Overcrowded conditions in today's prisons could probably be controlled by updating many of state and federal laws to a realistic level. There are far too many laws which are punishable by imprisonment. There are more reasonable punishments for crimes which won't be corrected in prison.

2. Confusion is the answer I believe. What I mean is who is involved; Students. But what is a student? he is normally a highly intelligent person who is anxious to do something. The question is what do they do. They for the most part don't know. They have some ideas which they may have come up with by themselves or friends or parents may have given them before they went to school. When they sit down and try to get it all together, though, in the majority of cases, it comes up confusion. So now, here we have a group of highly intelligent people with no goals set to work on. This produces boredom in a short time. A few of probably the more intelligent ones take a look around at the conditions of things in general and decide that the situation needs correction, so they become leaders and attempt to make changes which they are not really prepared to handle so in many cases in trying to correct problems that they see, they cause more disruption than cure. No matter what the cause though, these leaders have no problem finding followers. College students need to have a chance to set their goals properly and find themselves prior to making the decision to go to college and study a particular field. There is far too much stress put on going to college immediately after high school before they have a chance to find themselves. In many cases this leads to campus disruption and wasted money due to students dropping out of school. This is seen easily by looking around right here on big SAM at how many college drop-outs are on board.

1. I think you can still get a fair trial. It will probably cost quite a sum of money, but expert council is essential. I would be better if you were a nobody so following exoneration you could leave town and start anew. The chances would not be so good if the press became interested. This would be particularly bad if you were a prominent member of the community, worse if you were the son or daughter of one. It might be wise to ally yourself with a cause or movement not only to dissipate the blame but possibly to share expenses. If you don't you could always be associated with the wrong one to your detriment.

If exoneration means the end of your reputation, guilt will mean the ruination of your life and the crippling of your spirit. This is the price that prison exacts, but even before your sentence, you could well be doing time in jail. Like those people arrested on May 1st 1968 in WASH, D.C.. No Bond, no bail, Wash. Jail. Several were homosexually assaulted long before they got to court. The list of indignities is too long to mention. Then they were freed but better post bond. Recent publicity has more than adequately brought the prison situation to your attention. Perhaps before you are subject to it, it would behoove you into improving the "correctional" system.

Perhaps in past years the situation was worse. I don't doubt that prisons were. These days it looks like capital punishment is on the way out, and personally I'm glad. Yet I question that the court were anything but better than they are now. Bearing under the precedents of the Chicago Seven, Angela Davis, and the Baniens, the system is looking tired and taxed. So if you go to court, perhaps it's good to keep in mind that you will not face the bench alone. The law itself is tried right along side of you. This after all is the purpose of the judicial branch, as a check and balance of executive power. If all ~~the system fails~~ fails the system of government as we know it. When the court and jury of peers are ushered out, time will be near for ushering in dictatorship, martial rule, and totalitarianism.

2. There are as many causes for unrest on the university campus as there are university students. Besides the students, there are other reasons. The college is not the quiet place it was when the major subjects were Astronomy, Astrology, and Philosophy and a course of study didn't end with a work permit at the defense plant. It seems pretty absurd to personally petition a university of 30,000 students for a curriculum change. The course of study for an undergraduate or even post-graduate can look depressingly predetermined. I've heard tell that it's easier to get a degree than learn something.

The University is big -- it's geared for mass production -- it is sensitive to organized pressures more than individual ones. The campus grounds are swarming with young people who never have had so many decisions to make before. The stage is set for futility, frustration, and a tendency to huddle together. Groups seem to help, but they represent an intermediate phase. Group petitions become movement's demands. If you play your causes right, you can make your modestly small group enormously attractive to

large numbers of people literally overnight. People pick sides since movements and demands invariably polarize people. What happens is history.

For me, this points to a certain common quality most people share -- a kind of latent desire to pick up a stick and go screaming down the hill with everyone else. This same seed has grown patriots and revolutionaries and populated armies wherever they are found. We each of us have it -- I think -- a kind of lurking fear, will to violence, power-worshiping Mr. Hyde who defies exorcising. I notice mine, or I should say I used to sometimes as I would watch the news on TV. It would demonstrate inside of me when I would see films or worse, live coverage, of the Vietman War, and it would just as readily go to war when the pictures of the demonstrators would come on. If you too have felt this way or if you have a kind of up-tight feeling, as if you would like to find a movement or perhaps the nearest revolution, you might try this as it has helped a lot for me. Just SIT -- That's all, you just find a spot, get comfortable, sort of let your eyelids close on their own and just SIT, not scratch, not think, not sleep, JUST SIT. The violence, fear, power-worship goes away. This can be done in classrooms on college campuses, also in policecars and precinct houses -- see how perfectly it could end riots and restore education to the University.
