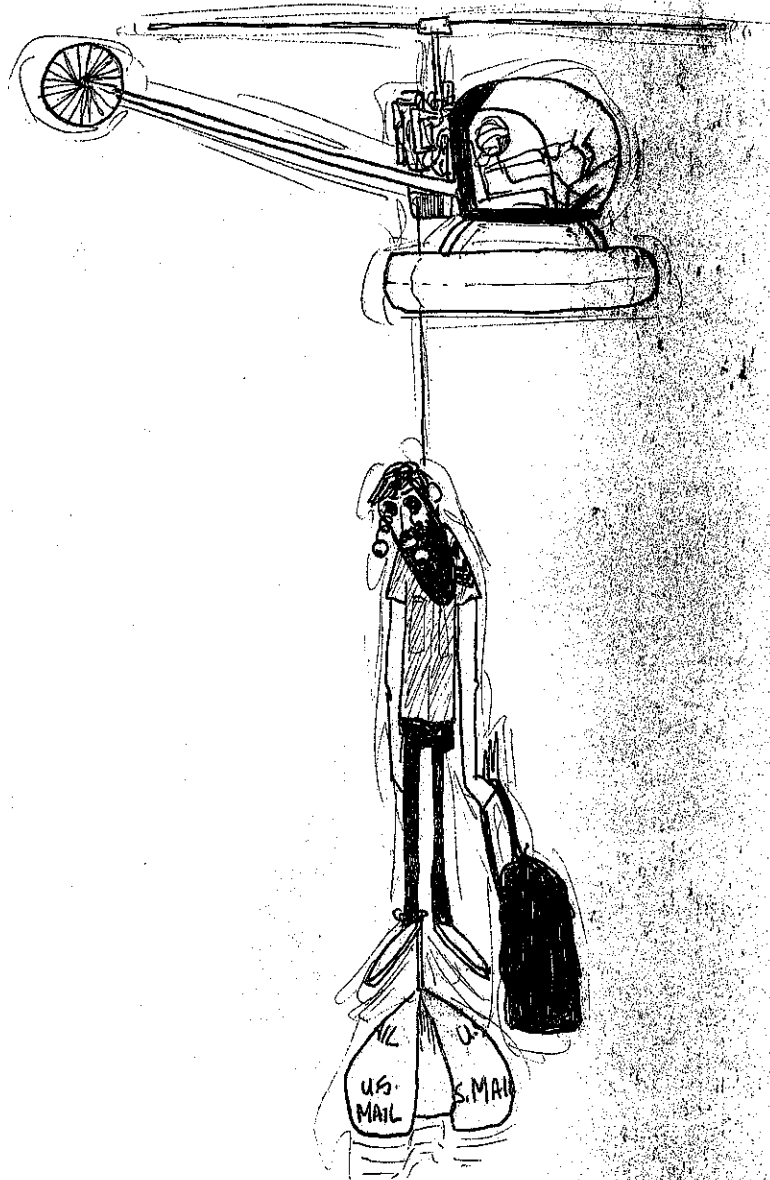

THE SENATE judiciary committee has agreed to vote next Tuesday on the Supreme Court nominations of Lewis Powell and William Henquist. At the demand of five Senators, Chairman James Eastland agreed to have the FBI check into allegations that Henquist was once connected with a conservative political group called "Arizonans for America."

CAMBODIA HAS ASKED South Vietnam for help on the northeastern front, where the North Vietnamese have cut a 20,000-man task force off from Phnom Penh. South Vietnamese officials in Saigon say the Phnom Penh Government wants a total of 1,000 Artillerymen and Engineers, and some big guns. The object would be to reopen a stretch of the highway from Phnom Penh to the

task force. Enemy troops are reported within 12 miles of downtown Phnom Penh. But western military men in the Cambodian capital discount the ability of the enemy to make a full attack on Phnom Penh.

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THE U. S. CATHOLIC Conference of Bishops urged a speedy end to the war in Vietnam.

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THE U. S. SUPREME Court has refused to delay Monday's scheduled trial of 25 persons on charges stemming from the 1970 disorders at Kent State University in Ohio. The decision was six to one, with Justice William Douglas the lone dissenter. The defendants are students former students and faculty members of Kent State. Four students died when Ohio National Guardsmen opened fire to put down the demonstrations.

NINETEEN-YEAR OLD Sherri Watkins is the only single woman Airman living at Laughlin Air Force Base in Texas but it still isn't utopia. She says she sometimes misses just having another girl to talk to. She's in the Air Force and handles printing equipment. ED: Sherri makes more money than any one on the base.

REPUBLICAN GOVERNORS open a two-day conference today in the Indiana resort town of French Lick. Principal subject of discussion will be government and politics and the means of enlarging the governors' roles in the 1974 election campaign. Seventeen of the GOP Governors are on hand and Vice President Agnew is featured

in an opening day speech. The Republican National Chairman, Senator Robert Dole of Kansas, was also scheduled to speak but his speech was postponed because of scheduled senate action on an amendment skking public financing 72 presidential campaigns.

A DYNAMITE explosion damaged a four-story building on the East side of Montreal last night, seriously injuring one man. Police said the man apparently was assembling several pounds of dynamite for use in a bomb and it went off prematurely.

BRITISH TROOPS in Belfast seized 23 suspected terrorists in early morning raids today bringing the total taken into custody since August to more than 100. Later a mob of about 200 rampaged through the streets, throwing rocks and smashing store windows.

IN AN UNUSAL show of unanimity, the pay board digressed briefly from setting wage standards Tuesday. The board voted 14 to 0 to congratulate board chairman George Boldt and his wife on their 43rd wedding anniversary.

A HIGH-LEVEL VATICAN official died today when his car veered off a street in Rome and crashed into a tree. The 58 year old priest, the Reverend Johann Schutte, had been driving to a clinic for treatment of a mild Heart Attack he suffered yesterday. Police say he may have suffered another one while driving. He was Vice-Secretary of the Vatican Commission on Justice and Peace. He

formerly was a missionary to China.

CONGRESSMAN Wilbur Mills Predicts a victory for labor in its fight for retroactive payment of wage hikes. The powerful chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee make his predtion in Miami. The Arkansas Democrat says the issue will probably wind up being settled in court. And he forecast a victory for labor over the Nixon Administration.

LONGSHORE UNION Vice-President Anthony Scotto has raised hopes of a quick settlement in the 49 day east and gulf coast dock strike. He predicted in Miami Beach that major national issues could be settled by Sunday. He said local contracts could be on the table next Wednesday and ratification votes slated for a week from Friday. The union chief did not detail what action had been taken on specific contract demands. The walkout was sparked by a call for a guaranteed income for Dock Workers. Union Leaders and Shippers have been talking in Miami Beach since early Wednesday.

CONGRESSMAN RONALD Dellums says some blacks who complained of alleged military discrimination ARE being punished. The california Democrat and other members of the congressional black caucus had listened to those complaints. Dellums syas he was promised by Defense Secretary Laird that no reprisals would be taken against men who testified during the unofficial investigation. Caucus members visited 13 military bases this week.

IT COULD have been a replay of the blood feud between the Hatfield and the McCoys, with the locate moved to the hillsides of Southern Mexico. THE SENATE Banking Committee has voted to allow pay increases negotiated before August 15th retroactively except under one condition. That condition is that they are determined to be unreasonably inconsistent with guidelines established by the pay board. The committee also voted to extend the President's authority to control wages and prices for an additional year beyond next April 30th. The determination on

the amount of pay increases that would be unreasonably inconsistent was left to the president. He would be able, however, to delegate the authority to the pay board.

SENATE AND HOUSE conferees have worked out renewed interim spending authority for the legally penniless defense, foreign aid and anti-poverty programs. The temporary authority runs until December 8th. This came after the house resurrected its old Senate-rejected three and a half billion dollar foreign aid bill. And House leaders hope to eventually pass it. Final House and Senate approval is scheduled later Thursday for the renewal of interim spending authority for the nearly 80 billion dollars worth of programs. Present authority expired Monday. The House originally voted to extend interim authority until the end of the session. But the Senate voted to extend it only until December First. Thus the need for a compromise.

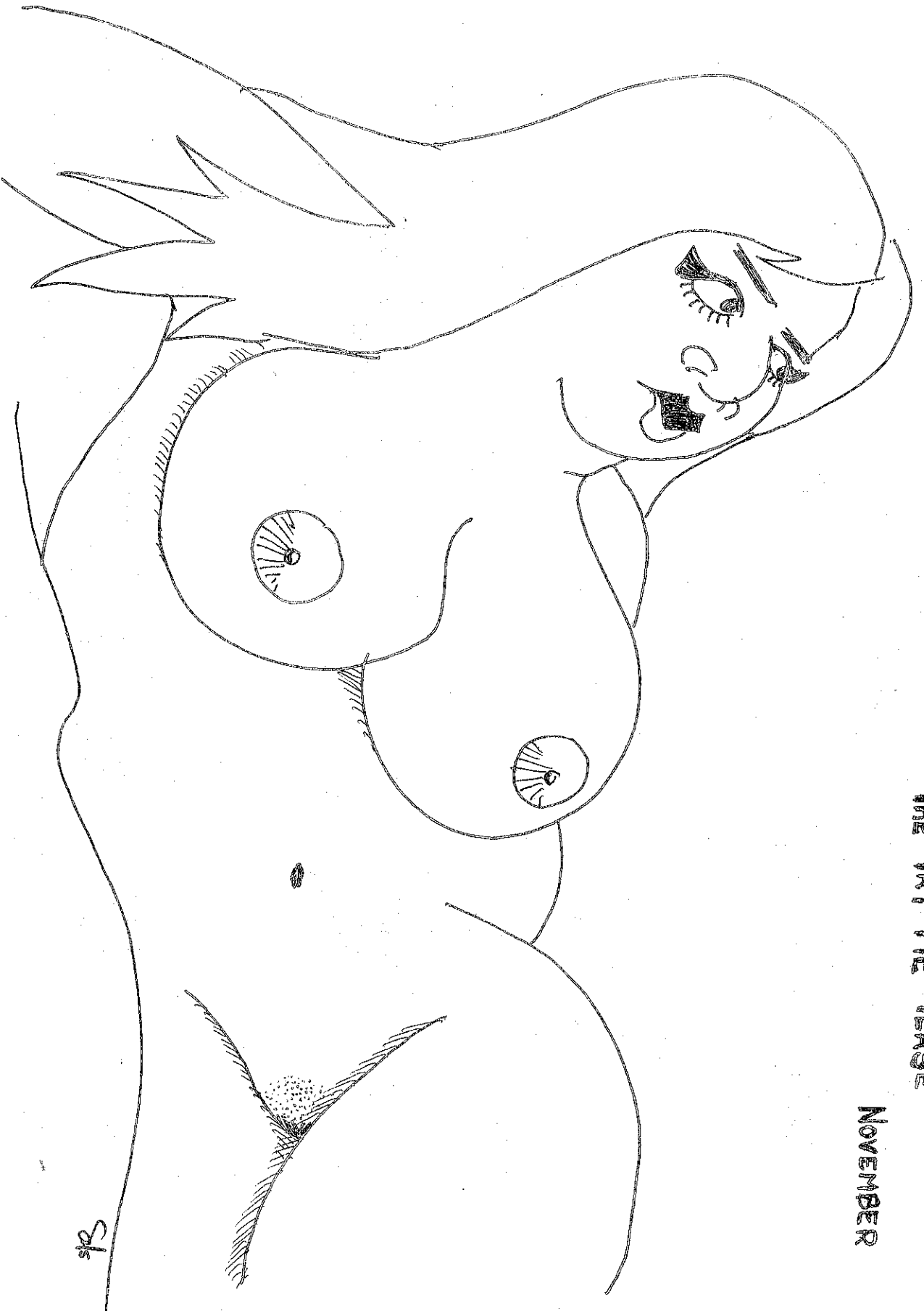
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THE SENATE Appropriations Committee has voted to cut 800 million dollars more from President Nixon's Defense Budget. And it approved reducing U. S. troops strength in Europe to 250,000 men from the present 300,000. The committee sent to the Senate floor a bill providing 70 and a quarter billion dollars for defense spending, the latest is a series of amendments aimed at cutting of all military spending in Vietnam, except for funds required to withdraw all U. S. forces.

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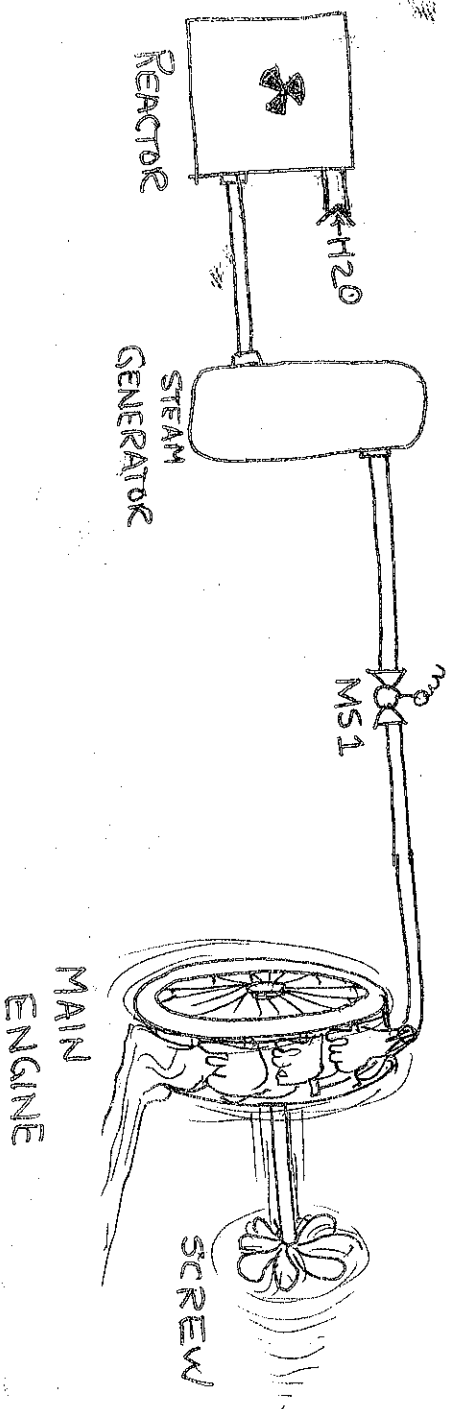

THE LABOR Department says the cost of living rose one-tenth of a percent last month. That's the smallest rise in more than four years the labor Department says new cars and nothing accounted for most of the increase. Ezra Solomon, a presidential economic adviser, says he thinks the "Price-wage freeze has helped break inflation.

THE SENATE Friday was locked in battle over a plan for Presidential campaign financing with no visible signs of a break. The Democratic and Republican leaders say some backstage negotiations are going on that could crack the stalemate. Republicans continue to offer amendments to the proposal that would make public funds available to presidential candidates. Democrats are trying to attach the plan to a 27 Billion dollar tax bill before the Senate. The republican amendments were being defeated, but each was allotted one hour debates. Democratic Senator Russell Long of Louisiana said the G-O-P lawmakers could tie up the senate until Easter if they wanted to.

* * * *

COMMUNIST PRESSURE around Phnom Penh is said to be easing. Some 6,000 communists now surround the Cambodian capital. About 8,000 Cambodians are defending the city. The Cambodian high command describes the situation around Phnom Penh as "quiet".

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THE CHAIRMAN of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Admiral Thomas Moore, says he sees no immediate or serious threat to Phnom Penh by communists. He says the communists are weakened by a supply shortage.

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A SHIP report late Friday afternoon indicates tropical storm Laura may be drifting Southeastward. At 8 PM it was estimated to be about 2,008 miles northeast of British Honduras.

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HOUSE-SENATE Forgeiga aid conferees held their first meeting Friday. They said later they're optimistic they can work for a bill but that it will be difficult.

* * * *

IT'S FRIDAY in Japan and policeman expecting one of the biggest american demonstration in 11 years. Some two-million union members walked off their jobs in Tokyo and other major cities. Thousands of other persons stayed home. It's a gigantic protest against the terms the U. S. demanded before returning Okinawa to Japanese control.

* * * *

A POWER FAILURE Thursday night at Brisbane, Australia, plunged hundreds of houses, hotels and hospitals into darkness, trapped dozens of persons in elevators and knocked two TV stations off the air. City spikesmen said the 35 minute-long blackout was caused when a tree fell against a 33,000 volt power line.

* * * *

THE LEADER of the Militant Jewish Defense League wants to swap black american prisoners for Russian Jews. Speaking in London, Rabbi Meir Kahane says the U. S. should send the Russians 50 inmates from Attica Prison. He described them as "men American would be well rid of." He said, in turn, the Russians should let 50 Jews they have in jail go.

WORLD NEWS

DIPLOMATIC SOURCES at the U-N say the ten non-permanent members of the Security Council have asked the five permanent members to open talks on the new five-year term in six weeks and leadership post as the head of the U-N Secretary. The sources said that on a Belgian suggestion the non-permanent members met privately Wednesday. Then, asked the Security Council President to convey to the permanent members their view that consultations with their successor should start as soon as possible. There's been no immediate reaction from the permanent members.

* * * * *

A RED CHINESE Delegate denounced the Saudi Arabian ambassador at the U-N for expressing shock at reports of a Chinese nuclear test explosion. The delegate spoke before Peking had announced it made the Test Thursday, and he emphasized that Red China development of nuclear weapons is for self-defense. He said Peking would not be the first to use a nuclear weapon. Saudi Arabian ambassador Jamil Baroudi touched off the Chinese statement by asserting in the assembly's main political committee that both the U.S. and Red China had tested nuclear devices within the last two weeks. He has introduced a resolution that would have the General Assembly appeal to all nuclear powers to stop all nuclear explosions.

* * * * *

SENATOR WILLIAM Proxmire issued excerpts from a speech by Agriculture Secretary-nominee Earl Butz. Butz is quoted as saying the food stamp program is "just short of ridiculous in some parts of this country." The program is administered by the Agriculture Department. Proxmire, a Wisconsin Democrat, says Butz delivered the speech in Minneapolis last April 26. In one instance Butz was said to have referred to Florida hearings by Senator George McGovern of South Dak-

Senator Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts to Alaska to in Butz' words "see the starving Eskimos" Butz said "out of that came a food stamp plan so generous, so extensive, that it's just short of ridiculous in some parts of the country." And he added, "out of it came a welfare program that President Nixon is recommending to the Congress that's so far out that even the Democrats in congress won't but it."

ED: Democrats in congress don't need it! * * * *

THE FIRST YEAR of the new coal industry contract was approved by the PAS Board Friday. The vote was ten-to-three. The five labor and five management members approved the contract. But three of the five members said in a statement such an increase in wages clearly runs against the goal of the stabilization effort. The miners' agreement easily surpassed the board's wage-guideline of five and a half per cent. Shortly after the board announced its action, United Mine Workers President Tony Boyle issued a statement. He said the entire three-year contract is binding since the board has no jurisdiction beyond next April 30th. The three-year pact which ended a lengthy nation wide strike recently is said to call for a 39 per cent increase.

* * * * *

PRESIDENT NIXON is back at the White House after addressing the AFL-CIO Convention at Miami Beach. Aides say he was apparently shocked and angered at his cold reception and what was termed his dismissal. One aide said privately that Mr. Nixon was treated with "studied contempt" by officials of the huge labor organization. Mr. Nixon originally had planned to spend the weekend in Florida. Instead he returned to Washington. Aides

THE AFL-CIO Executive Council has recommended to the Federation Convention that labor's representatives remain on the Pay Board only so long as a reasonable hope exists of achieving labor's objectives. The council said in Miami Beach these goals are: Securing for working people generally. The Executive Council said until these objectives are assured, labor can not associate itself with the actions of the board.

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THE CHAIRMAN of the U. S. Steel Edwin Gott, has approved President Nixon's new economic program. Gott says it offers a constructive approach to the nation's economic problems and gives promise of improving future prospects for the steel industry. In a speech in San Francisco, Gott says temporary wage and price controls represent an interference with our economic system. But he says it's a question of having to take the good with the bad.

ED: What the hell can be bad with a salary commensurate to the Presidents.

THE U. S. HAS announced a new nuclear test by Communist China. The first since October of last year. The Atomic Energy Commission says the explosion Thursday was in the atmosphere. The AEC rates its explosive yield as equivalent to about 20,000 tons of TNT. That is the same size as primitive U. S. Bomb dropped on Hiroshima.

ED: This could achieve the population control China is so desperately in need of. (Remember Hiroshima?)

IN WASHINGTON, Israeli Ambassador Yitzhak Rabin indicates his government does not consider as final U. S. refusal to supply Israel with additional jet aircraft. Rabin

spoke to newsmen after a 30-minute conference with assistant secretary of State Sisco. WE could probably Jew him down to a few P-3's...

PRESIDENT NIXON has taken a setback from the party's left wing as California fund raiser William King defected to the opposition. King said in Washington he is joining the Democratic Party and will support Senator Edmund Muskie for president. King had raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for Nixon and other Republican Candidates.

* * * *

STATE DEPARTMENT officials report evidence several Soviet TU-16 planes, fewer than ten, have been added to Soviet forces in Egypt since November 1st. Spokesman Charles Bray says this country is assessing the implications of the development. Officials say TU-16s may be reconnaissance planes or bombers.

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INDIA HAS GONE to the United Nations with its charges against Pakistan. In a letter to U N Secretary, General Thant, Prime Minister Indira Gandhi claims "Pakistan is seriously preparing to launch a large scale, armed conflict with India."

THE NEW REVOLUTIONARY Party Government in Thailand is adopting a get tough attitude. Prime Minister Thanom Kittikachorn has warned government officials they will be subject to "absolute punishment" for acting against national interests. Thanom says such punishment could mean execution.

ISRAELI DEFENSE Minister Moshe Dayan says his nation is on the wrong end of a shift in the balance of mideast power. He told a United States United Jewish Appeal Delegation in Tel Aviv that the so-called shift comes at a time when Egypt intends renewed warfare. He notes that "Egypt continues to receive a steady flow of arms from the Soviet Union," and he says the Egyptians apparently intend to "open fire."

* * * *

A ROOFTOP SNIPER killed a British soldier in Belfast Thursday. He was the 39th to die in Northern Ireland this year. Meanwhile, the Army continued to round up suspected terrorists. Two Roman Catholic Priests were held for questioning. They're suspected of aiding guerrilla fugitives.

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THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT indicates it has a second informant in its case against the Reverend Phillip Berrigan and seven other antiwar activists in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. The disclosure came when the government moved for permission to withhold unidentified documents from the defense. Berrigan and the others are charged with conspiring to kidnap Presidential Adviser Henry Kissinger. They are also accused with destruction of draft records.

* * * *

A HELICOPTER PILOT who spent two Christmases in South Vietnam without a Christmas Tree is shipping 4,000 of them to troops there this year. Douglas Allan, a senior at California State University at Fullerton, and a former Seattle resident, has chartered an airplane to fly the small Montana firs to Bien Hoa this month. From Bien Hoa, they will be distributed by helicopter. The 42,000 dollar project was financed by donations from students. Civic

groups and Southern California businessmen. The trees were donated by the United States Forest Service and private growers.

"WOOPEE"

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SOUTH VIETNAM has agreed to send 13,000 troops into Cambodia to help relieve the communist pressure on Phnom Penh, Cambodian military sources said Friday. Nearly 8,000 Cambodian troops were already massing to protect their capital from a growing North Vietnamese threat. The sources said although the Saigon government had complied with a Cambodian request for support troops, the South Vietnamese forces would be stationed some distance outside Phnom Penh to avoid nationalistic friction between soldiers of the two nations. U. S. under-Secretary of State U. Alexis Johnson arrived in Phnom Penh Friday for consultations with U. S. and Cambodian officials and was to go on to Saigon on Saturday. Brig. Gen. Sak Sutsakhan, Cambodian Army Deputy Chief of Staff, flew to Saigon for meetings with the Saigon Government officials. Hanoi Radio charged Friday that South Vietnamese leaders are "planning to plunge recklessly into new military adventures in Cambodia in order to save the Phnom Penh puppet government from collapse." The U. S. command said American F-4 Phantom jets struck inside North Vietnam Friday for the eighth time in 11 days. The fighter-bombers attacked an antiaircraft battery 60 miles north of the DMZ after the communists fired on an unarmed photo reconnaissance plane.
